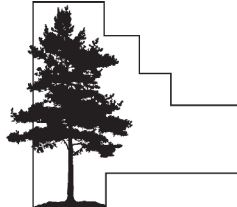

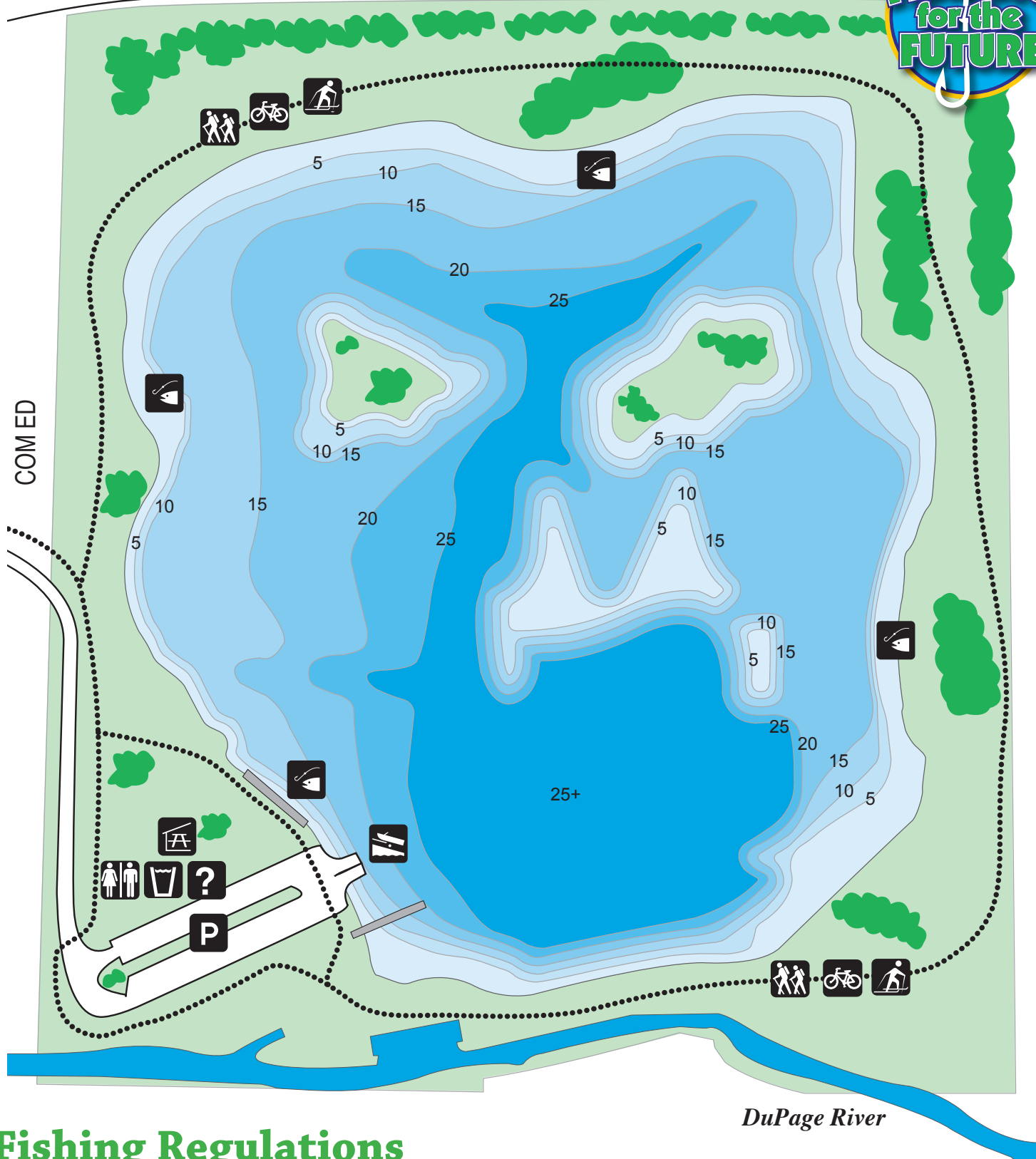

Fishing Regulations

Fishing is one of the most popular activities in the forest preserves, and the Forest Preserve District wants to make each angler's visit enjoyable. Catch-and-release fishing is an important conservation tool for maintaining healthy fish populations and quality fishing opportunities. Since the fish do not grow as fast as we can catch them, the District will enforce mandatory catch-and-release fishing at Whalon Lake to allow the young fishery to develop and stabilize. Once it has, sustainable harvest regulations will be established to ensure that there will be fish left for tomorrow and the future.

Some Fishing Rules:

- Any angler 16 years or older who is not legally disabled is required to carry a valid Illinois sport fishing license when fishing.
- Fishing hours coincide with posted Preserve hours. Fishing where permitted is at the user's own risk.
- Fishing at Whalon Lake is permitted anywhere along the fishing wall and shoreline, except in the area of the boat launch and boat dock. Waders or wading into the lake are not permitted.
- Fish may be released only into the same water from where they were taken. Do not release unused, live minnows.
- Only line fishing is allowed. Anglers may use a maximum of two poles, with no more than two hooks or lures attached to each.
